Villages and Diversity

Jacqueline Wallen, founding and Board member of Silver Spring Village, coordinated a panel on "Creating Diversity-Friendly Villages" for the Village-to-Village 2014 National Gathering in Crystal City in September. Key speakers were:

- Shannon Cockett, President, East Rock Creek Village, on racial diversity in Villages. She emphasized the importance of partnering with neighborhood organizations that have a history of racial inclusiveness and support for diversity in order to help achieve diversity goals.
- Susan Hester, Executive Director of Cleveland & Woodley Park Village, on including lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) members. She said it is important to understand LGBT terminology and the effects of long -term discrimination and suggested ways to indicate that a Village is a welcoming community.
- Marianna Blagburn, Executive Director of Northwest Neighbors Village, on economic diversity. She said that all Villages, no matter how affluent, should include lower income members. It is helpful to collaborate with public and low-cost providers of senior services and to provide low-cost activities for members.

Silver Spring Village welcomes members throughout our service area and is working to improve our diversity.

Member Benefit: "Checkbook"

Here is another good reason to become a Village member: You get the online Washington Consumer's Checkbook. Checkbook provides listings of top quality and price providers in 67 categories. It provides neighbor-to-neighbor comments or general advice on another 184 services categories, such as appliance stores, computer repair, handyman services, plumbers, auto body shops, and health care providers.

Using the online *Checkbook* you can select the best providers closest to home. Checkbook also has articles on planning before you select a service provider, what services you may want to consider, and how to save money.

Village volunteers can assist members who need help looking things up or who don't have Internet access. The Village has also negotiated discounts for members with some of the top-rated service providers in the community.

How to . . .

...become a member: Residents throughout the 20910 zip code are eligible. All members can attend all our events, get discounts from local businesses, receive a subscription to Washington Consumers' Checkbook, access our information service, and get referrals to professionals. Full members can also receive services from our volunteers such as transportation, indoor and outdoor household help, technology support, friendly visits, and check-ins. Membership dues cover less than half of our operating expenses and are: Full: \$350/ individual or \$450/couple; Associate: \$150/individual, \$250/couple.

...volunteer: People age 18 or older who support our "age in place" mission are invited to serve as volunteers. Volunteers are not required to be members of the Village (though they are welcome to join, and many do). They need to complete an interest form and application, and have a background check. Training will be provided. All applicants must be officially accepted and enrolled by the Volunteer Coordinator before performing tasks for the Village. All sorts of skills and interests are welcome.

...donate: To keep our Village strong, we need funding from a combination of organizational and individual donors, in-kind contributions, and grants. Contributions in any amount are gratefully accepted. Donations are tax-deductible, as permitted by law. Checks should be made to Silver Spring Village and mailed to Silver Spring Village, PO Box 8217, Silver Spring, MD 20907. Consider the Village in your will, in memorial donations, or in someone's honor. We would love to hear from local businesses that might provide in-kind contributions or discounts to our members. Reduced Cost Memberships

Silver Spring Village aims to be an inclusive community of neighbors helping neighbors. We want to make Village benefits available to our diverse economic population. That's why we set our membership dues as low as possible—about half the actual cost. Still, there are residents who can't afford the dues.

We are proud to announce we are launching a pilot program to subsidize membership fees for individuals and households with less than \$30,000 and \$38,500, respectively, in annual income, and with assets below \$50,000 (not including the value of any home and tax-deferred retirement savings). These scholarships, made possible by a donation from Seekers Church, are available for full memberships only.

The number of scholarships is very limited. They will be awarded to eligible applicants on a first-come, first-served basis. Enrollment will begin in the next few months.

The identities of inquirers and of scholarship recipients will be held strictly confidential. To learn more about how the scholarship works, contact Anne McHenry, chair of our Membership Committee, via (301) 503-7401.
